4-H Dog Tricks or Canine Free Style

Judging Class Levels:

<u>Junior</u> – Any 4-H member who is in 3^{rd} , 4^{th} , or 5^{th} grade on January 1 of current year. <u>Intermediate</u> – Any 4-H member who is in 6^{th} , 7^{th} , or 8^{th} grade on January 1 of current year. <u>Senior</u> – Any 4-H member who is in the 9^{th} grade or above on January 1 of current year.

Divisions:

Singles: One handler and one dog.

Brace: One handler and two dogs.

Pairs: Two handlers and two dogs.

Team: More than two handlers and an equal number of dogs.

Rules:

- 1. The trick or routine should last no more than 1 minute, (without special permission)
- 2. All dogs in the routine must be entered in 4-H and have a signed vet vaccination form.
- 3. Any props used must be approved before the competition. No non-dog animals allowed.
- 4. Dogs may be on-leash or off-leash. Penalties for tight leash or dropped leash.
- 5. Dogs may wear a decorative collar, neck scarf, or ankle bands (maximum 1.5").
- 6. If used, props must be appropriate and in good taste.
- 7. If used, handler costumes must be appropriate and in good taste.
- 8. If used, music must be appropriate and in good taste.
- 9. Judging class level is determined by highest level handler in Pairs or Team

Judging Criteria:

- 1. Spectator Appeal and Entertainment Value
 - a. How well the spectators appreciate, enjoy and respond.
 - b. Handler and dog are primarily facing the audience and judges.
 - c. Flow of movements from one to another by dog and handler
 - d. Trick, move or routine is interesting to watch
- 2. Creativity of Trick(s), Move(s), or Routine.
 - a. Difficulty, Intricacy, Complexity, and/or Innovation.
 - b. Variety of tricks or moves in routine.
 - c. Quality and creativity of choreography or layout of trick(s), move(s) or routine.
- 3. Dog Performance
 - a. Dog performs without the handler intervening.
 - b. Dog appears to be having an enjoyable experience.
 - c. Dog appears to be under the control of the handler.
 - d. Precise execution of movements.
- 4. Handler Showmanship [Music, props, and/or costumes are NOT required, but may be used.]
 - a. Animation, attitude, and attention of handler
 - b. Handler appears to be having an enjoyable experience
 - c. Smooth harmonious interaction between handler and dog.
 - d. Cues to dog are disguised.
 - e. Coordination with musical interpretation. (If music is used.)
 - f. Use of appropriate costumes and/or props. (If costumes/props are used.)
- 5. Penalties for tight leash, dropped leash, double handling from a person outside ring, disciplining, rules violation, dog fouling, or leaving ring.
